Brief Description of Field Trip:	The field trip involves collecting various specimens in the stream bed area. New specimens appear each year after spring runoff and after any major river flow.
Are there any Special Costs such as Admission Charge or Charge for Transportation on a Bus:	None.
Collectible Materials, if any: NOTE: SPECIFY IF COLLECTING CANNOT BE DONE	Petrified wood, Agates, River tumbled crystals, and some Indian Artifacts.
Est. Time of Return to Original Meeting Place:	2:00, but you can leave at park closing time if you wish to stay that long.
Vehicle Requirements, if any:	Any Vehicle will do.
Physical Limitation Concerns, Including Accessibility to Handicapped Individuals:	The stream bed is obviously rocky. Not recommended for those with any difficulty in walking on uneven surfaces.
Equipment or Tools Recommended or Required:	A small 3 pronged garden tool is recommended. A rock hammer might be useful, but not necessary. Something like a bucket or small back pack for carrying samples.
Availability of Water and Sanitary Facilities:	No water or restrooms at the parking site. Facilities located in Fountain.
Additional Comments:	This trip is for all members and especially the Pebble Pups and Juniors. Don't forget your sunscreen. Shorts and thick soled tennis shoes work well (especially if you want to wade in for a specimen). You may want to bring lunch or a snack. Sanitary wipes for cleaning your hands are recommended. It is not necessary to contact Drew Malin to reserve a spot for this field trip. NOTE: A 3 1/2 FOOT RATTLESNAKE WAS SEEN ALONG THE CREEK BANK LAST YEAR, SO BE CAREFUL WHERE YOU WALK.
